Understanding Learning and Thinking Differences

1 in 5 students have learning and thinking differences



Students with diagnosed Learning and Thinking Differences make up 5% of the U.S. student population.

An additional **15%** of the student population have significant learning differences but have not been formally identified or diagnosed.


Millions of students with learning and thinking differences are left unseen.

Historically marginalized groups receive less services and support

Students of color, ELLs, and those who have experiences of poverty are less likely to receive services they need and are more likely to spend time in restrictive environments.

Black students with disabilities are 3-4x more likely to receive an out-of-school suspension compared to white students with disabilities.

Race, class, gender, dis/ability intersect to create interdependent systems of disadvantage.



These systems impact students beyond K-12 education



- Students with disabilities drop out of high school at a rate 3x higher than their peers. Among them, Native American students with disabilities drop out at nearly twice the rate of white students with disabilities.
- Working-age adults with learning differences are twice as likely to be jobless as their peers. Even among employed adults, 80% say their employers are not aware of their disability and fewer than 1 in 20 get accommodations.
- People behind bars are roughly 3-4X times as likely to report having a disability as the nonincarcerated population.
