Educational Equity

A guarantee that educators engage ALL students with meaningful support that they need to reach and exceed a common standard through high-quality instruction.

Institutional Equity

Leadership, practices and culture that guarantee educators engage ALL students with meaningful support they need to meet and exceed a common standard through high-quality instruction.

In order to set a vision for instructional excellence in schools and districts that truly works toward achieving **educational** and **institutional equity**, educators must anchor on:

1) The unique **assets** and **experiences** their students bring to the table, and 2) the **persistent, systemic inequities** that those students face daily. This activity is designed to enable leaders to hone an **assets-based, growth mindset** about their students while placing their **unique needs** and **barriers to educational equity** at the forefront of their vision-setting process by asking and answering, *"Who are our students and what content area should be prioritized based on their needs?"*

What percentage of IEP goals were met last year? • What knowledge do you have about incoming/new students? • What languages are represented among students (e.g., English, Arabic, French) within the school community? 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • What is the overall distribution of scores and what story does that tell? <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ◦ Where are your students demonstrating mastery? ◦ Which students are furthest from mastery? • What is the percentage of students demonstrating mastery of major mathematical content and what are their demographics? • What is the percentage of students scoring below 30% at each grade level on literacy assessments and what are their demographics? • How can you leverage individual student strengths to target inequities that may exist? 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • What observational data exists to triangulate with student-level data? • Are there noticeable trends around suspension, attendance, PBIS, IEP goal-attainment data? • What trends exist among key subgroups (e.g., ELLs, students with IEPs, etc.)?
